Upon arriving at my first Trooper duty station in Butte many years ago, I was fortunate to meet Alice O'Donnell. Ms. O'Donnell was the Anaconda/Butte Area Coordinator at that time. Upon being introduced to Ms. O'Donnell, she informed me of my responsibilities as a new Trooper to get involved and assist her with carrying out the mission of the Hope Project. Ms. O'Donnell was very clear in her conversation to ensure I understood that my

I picked up Ms. O'Donnell, as scheduled, and I drove her to the wish recipient's house to present the Hope Bear, camera, and expense check. On our way to the residence, Ms. O'Donnell provided lots of conversation, but I didn't hear a word as I was trying to figure how long this would last and when I could get back to the important things I had to do.

We arrived at the recipient's house and I helped Ms. O'Donnell inside the residence. The recipient and his family were so very excited, and the joyous atmosphere was compared to that of Christmas morning before opening gifts. The feelings were contagious and my little "scrooge" heart began to grow. This atmosphere was wonderful, but I can clearly recall the exact moment I decided to dedicate myself to the Montana Hope Project's cause. Mr. Brouelette was a proud, hardworking man of Montana, who lived in the Bitterroot Valley for many years. He worked as a Human Resource Manager for the Washington Corporation, and one of his responsibilities was to oversee donations. The Washington Corporation has contributed to many causes over the years, but the needs of children and young adults has always been an area of interest. Mr. Brouelette also served on the board of directors for Montana State Fund.

In the 1980s, Mr. Brouelette took an interest in the Montana Hope Project and chose to ride in our annual Ride for Hope. The Ride for Hope is a yearly motorcycle event where people from all over the state gather donations and participate in a rally. Riders travel an outlined route on the 2nd weekend in July, and everyone convenes at a predetermined venue. Here we have a banquet and share stories of the ride and the events over the last year since we were all together. Back in the day, the Ride for Hope was known as a 1,000 mile ride. It has been shortened a bit over the years, but it is still our largest fundraiser that we host to this day. The last Ride that Mr. Brouelette was on occurred in 1997.

Mr. Brouelette's passion for the children of Montana who are critically ill continued long after that last Ride, and upon his death, Mr. Brouelette remembered these children and their needs. Mr. Brouelette willed the Montana Hope Project \$300,000.00. This generous donation has been wisely invested and will be a vital part of many, many wishes for future Montana Hope Project Children of Hope.

100 wishes granted

■ Frenchtown junior with cystic fibrosis gets wish; Hope Project celebrates service

When the Montana Hope Project asked Grant Simpson to make a wish, his first thought was: "I'll learn how to

fly."
Which was a bit much for his mom's nerves.

So she suggested an alternative that would guarantee years of on-theground enjoyment: a

computer. He quickly agreed.
"This is something I have wanted for a long time," Simpson said at a Friday night party celebrating not only his

new IBM Aptiva, but the 100th wish granted by the Montana Hope Project.

A junior at Frenchtown High School, Simpson has cystic fibrosis, an inherited disease that affects growth and causes chronic lung infections. For Simpson, it means three or four stays in the hospital a year, most recently at Childrens Hospital in Seattle.

He loves math and computers and the black cowboy hat he got for eighthgrade graduation.

And he is, as his friends and family testified Friday, much loved.

"Grant is a great kid," said Dr. Daniel Combo, his physician since birth and one of those who suggested he make a wish to the Hope Project.

The wish-granting program gives seriously ill children and teen-agers "something to look forward to and to focus on besides their chronic problem," said Combo. "A disease like cystic fibrosis is every day, every day, every day. It doesn't go away.'

But neither does Simpson's optimism and good humor, said Combo.



The Hope Project is coordinated through the Montana Highway Patrol and funded by the Lawman 1000 – an annual 1,000-mile motorcycle ride that draws not only Highway Patrol officers, but big-hearted motorcycle enthusiasts from throughout Montana and the Northwest.

In seven years, the Lawman 1000 has raised \$503,000. The computer given Simpson on Friday marked the project's 100th wish granted, "a goal we never imagined reaching," said Mitch Tuttle, a Highway Patrol officer and volunteer chairman of the Hope Project.

"We started out paying for everything out of our own pockets," Tuttle said. "But we couldn't reach enough kids

With the success of the motorcycle ride, "we have never had to say no because of lack of funds," Tuttle said. "And it's all by word of mouth. We have no paid directors. All the many recent to be kide. All the many is directors. All the money goes to the kids. All the work is for the kids."

Betty Simpson, Grant's mom, knew of the Lawman 1000 from co-workers at Stone Container Corp. who ride in the fund-raiser each June. "But we had never really pursued anything or really thought about asking for a

wish until Dr. Combo suggested we apply," she said.
The pizza, cake and pop party at the Grant Creek Inn
was an added bonus – to which Grant was told to invite 100 friends and family members. He gladly obliged, inviting also volunteers from the Montana Hope Project and Lawman 1000.

"I have been so excited about this," he said at party's start. "I've got my desk all cleared off at home for the computer." There are papers to be typed for school, Simpson reported. And computer games to be mastered. And the Internet to be surfed.

Computer programming is an interest, too, Simpson d, possibly as a career or college major.
"Or maybe," Simpson said, his mom safely out of

earshot, "maybe I'll meet some pilots on the Internet. And learn how to fly."

Thank you so much for granting Shay's wish to see a Celtics game in Boston! We had so much fun. On our trip, we took in the sights of New York City for a day, then drove to Boston from there to Shay's doctor appointments at Boston Children's Hospital.

After his appointments, we went to TD Garden, watched the Celtics warm up, took pictures on the basketball court, and Shay was presented with a bunch of gifts (a jersey with his last name on it, t-shirt, Celtic shoes, socks, and a hat)!

We then went into a private restaurant in TD Garden, ate a delicious supper, and had a surprise visitor, Leon Powe. Leon played for the Celtics from 2006-2009, and played in the championship for the Celtics in 2008, which they won! It was such an honor meeting and visiting with him.

After supper, we watched the Celtic game against the New Orleans Pelicans; the Celtics won the super exciting game!

Thank you for our trip, Montana Hope Project! We would have never been able to do this without you as we are in over our heads with medical debt and all the medical travel expenses.

Shay was diagnosed with a Prolactinoma in January of 2015; it was during basketball season when he started not feeling well. Shay has been a varsity basketball and varsity football player throughout his high school years.

Even after we found out about his tumor, the doctors allowed him to continue sports as long as he felt up to it. Shay is so strong and no matter how sick he was, he always pushed through and played. He is my hero!

A lot of people have pituitary tumors (Prolactinoma), but Shay's is complex as there is no opening; the tumor is completely surrounding/engulfing his pituitary. This makes surgery very risky as it could result in Shay going blind, pancreatitis, and diabetes insipidus.

These results would be permanent the rest of his life. Since being diagnosed up until now, the doctors are trying to shrink his tumor with medication making surgery the very last resort.

The pituitary tumor has caused Shay to be short (his growth plates are closed, so he cannot take growth hormones); he is 18 years of age and 5'3," but that did not slow him down with sports; he is an incredible athlete in both football and basketball!

The tumor has also wreaked havoc with his thyroid and testosterone levels. Shay will be under medical advisement for probably the rest of his life, although, he continues to stay positive and upbeat.

Thank you so much for blessing our family! We cannot even begin to express our gratitude!







Greysen's Wish

When we first applied for Greysen's wish, I was hesitant because I knew there were other kids more medically fragile than him, and I didn't want to take away from those children. Dave assured me that this was about Greysen, and he deserved a wish just as much as anyone else. It brought me back to the day that we sat with Greysen in his hospital room at Denver Children's Hospital awaiting his first of many surgeries. I can remember seeing children that were much sicker than him. I also remember seeing kids that weren't as sick as Greysen and therefore wouldn't face the challenges he would. It was then that I realized I could not compare my child's circumstances to other children's because what other kids were going through did not discredit what my child was going through.

Greysen had spent the first 6 years of his life undiagnosed with Hirschsprung's Disease, which meant 6 years of pain and suffering and doctors telling us he was fine when we knew he wasn't. As a parent, watching your child suffer when you know something isn't right is like screaming, but the sound will not come out. His lack of a diagnosis has lead to 3 surgeries and several other complications, some of which are hard for him to talk about due to the nature of this disease. At the time of receiving his wish, Greysen was facing another surgery and was in a very difficult place emotionally. He had developed anxiety from the daily treatments he was receiving and was very depressed. Receiving a wish was just what he needed!

I have two distinct memories from our time at Give Kids the World that I will never forget. The first is standing in the castle of miracles looking at Greysen's star. Wish Kids are given a star with their name on it, and the star is then placed on the ceiling in the castle for all to see. Each star represents a child with an illness. Greysen was able to see that he wasn't the only one fighting a battle. He was able to see that he is not alone in his fight, and that someone else understands what he is going through. The second memory I have is when we decided to go for a swim at GKTW. We had just walked a decent ways from our villa to the pool when we realized we had forgotten Greysen's swim shirt. He always wears his swim shirt because it hides his scars and cecostomy tube. Without hesitation he said, "That's ok, mom. I don't need it here because I know everyone here understands." To experience such freedom was a priceless gift!

Receiving a wish has given Greysen and our family so much more than just a vacation to Disney World; it's given us a new sense of hope and a new family! Being part of the Hope family has given Greysen the support he needs to continue battling this disease, and the opportunity to see that he isn't alone. We are grateful for Greysen's medical journey that has given us an understanding and compassion toward other Hope families going through an illness of their own.
